John Taylor



John Taylor is the Mary and Robert Raymond Professor of Economics at Stanford University. He is also the Bowen H. and Janice Arthur McCoy Senior Fellow at the Hoover Institution. Taylor's fields of expertise are monetary policy, fiscal policy, and international economics. Taylor has an active interest in public policy. He served as senior economist on President Ford's Council of Economic Advisers, and as a member of President George H.W. Bush's Council of Economic Advisers. For four years from 2001 to 2005, Taylor served as Under Secretary of Treasury for International Affairs. He was awarded the Medal of the Oriental Republic of Uruguay, for design and implementation of financial measures to deal with the crisis of 2002, and the Alexander Hamilton Award in 2005 for his leadership in international finance at the U.S. Treasury.

His book *Global Financial Warriors: The Untold Story of International Finance in the Post 9/11 World* describes his years as head of the international division at Treasury. Before joining the Stanford faculty, he held positions as professor of economics at Princeton University and Columbia University. Taylor received a B.A. in economics *summa cum laude* from Princeton University in 1968 and a Ph.D. in economics from Stanford University in 1973.
